REQUEST FOR POLICE & CRIME COMMISSIONER DECISION - (N° 009 / 2018)

TITLE: Funding for Speed Laser Guns and Equipment

Executive Summary:

The Police and Crime Plan's objective 3 'Tackle Crime and Anti-Social Behaviour' links to the priority to target speeding and dangerous driving. The OPCC has received several requests for funding from Community Groups looking to purchase Speed Laser Devices. However, after consultation with Constabulary leads around roads policing it has been proposed that the Commissioner considers supporting the existing Neighbourhood Speed Watch Schemes, this would ensure a level of regulation and support is present around the use of such devices.

Recommendation:

The Commissioner is asked to:

 Consider funding Neighbourhood Watch Schemes £9,453.90, funding will be used to purchase 3x additional Speed Laser Devices, one for each area to support the existing scheme and equipment available, plus additional high visible jackets and signs.

PART 1 – NON CONFIDENTIAL FACTS AND ADVICE TO THE PCC

1. Introduction & Background

Neighbourhood Speed Watch programs are national initiatives where active members of local communities join with the support of the police to monitor speeds of vehicles using speed detection devices. The program encourages citizens to take an active role in changing driver behaviour on their neighbourhood streets by helping raise public awareness and educate drivers about the negative impact of speeding. Vehicles exceeding a speed limit are referred to the police with the aim of educating drivers to reduce their speeds. In cases where education is blatantly ignored and evidence of repeat or excessive offences is collated (even across county borders), enforcement and prosecution follow.

Speeding continues to be a concern for many communities in both rural and urban environments. Volunteers received appropriate training and are supported by neighbourhood policing team (NPT) staff. The scheme aims to cater for the problem of real or perceived speed related offending, and through partnership with the community it is to be used in circumstances that are necessary, justifiable and proportionate in order to:-

- Reduce death and injury on the roads
- Improve the quality of life for local communities
- Reduce the speed of vehicles to the speed limit
- Increase public awareness of inappropriate speed

The proposal to provide funding for 3x additional Speed Laser Guns and equipment supported through the Neighbourhood Speed Watch Scheme and Constabulary will have long-term cost efficiencies. There are 53 Parish Councils in Cumbria to continue to provide funding through the OPCC Property Fund could result in a cost to the OPCC of £167,018.90. As previously stated there is some discrepancies around the impact of stand-alone groups, many Speed Watch Groups that are not part of the national scheme are unregulated, untrained and the guns purchased are generally not of ACPO standard.

2. Issues for Consideration

Unregulated use of Speed Laser Devices has the potential to cause issues within communities, previous incidents have occurred resulting in violence against the person offences due to the misuse of such devices. With the current Neighbourhood Watch Schemes, Community volunteers are screened for suitability to use such devices, support is given around correct use and the community benefits from direct Police action and analysis on the community hotspots.

The options of funding additional devices through the open grants schemes such as property and community fund would hinder and undermine the current initiatives and procedures in place. Additionally, there is no statutory requirements for the Constabulary to carry out checks on unregulated devices and information provided. The unregulated use of these devices could result on increased demands on police resources
