No questions had been received from members of the public prior to the meeting.

## 005. MINUTES

The Chair presented the minutes of the Public Accountability Conference held on the 12<sup>th</sup> July 2021, these had previously been circulated with the agenda. The minutes were agreed as an accurate record and signed by the Chair.

A discussion took place in relation to Community Triggers and around repeat incidents. There is a broader piece of work that is being led by Chief Inspector Sherlock. Chief Superintendent Jackson will pick this up and will discuss further with Vivian Stafford in a separate meeting.

## 006. FINANCIAL SUMMARY 2021/22 – QUARTER2 TO SEPTEMBER 2021

The report was presented by the Chief Finance Officer on a 'by exception' basis.

We are now halfway through the financial year and the forecast underspend currently stands at £203k (combined budget) which equates to 0.2% of the overall budget. The majority of the underspend (£187k) is attributed to the Constabulary while the remaining £16 is attributed to the OPCC.

The Capital Budget has seen some slippage, but remains within tolerances. There has been reduced expenditure on premises with a fixed contract on utilities which runs to the end of the financial year.

The main slippage has been seen in ICT schemes. Fleet have also experienced issues procuring vehicles, although these are now starting to come through & the fleet programme is expected to get back on track. It was noted that vehicle costs have increased significantly like for like.

It was noted that inflation is expected to have an impact in the next financial year.

Operation Uplift - We are slightly above target on officer numbers, this has been offset by a number of police staff vacancies (approximately 60) – work is ongoing with HR in relation to this. The graph on page 6 of the presentation shown the officer numbers and projected actuals – we will be quite a way ahead of Op Uplift targets by the end of the financial year which puts us in a good position for the start of the next phase.

Non staff budgets are also showing an underspend. There has been some reduced activity due to COVID but a detailed analysis still needs to be carried out to drill down into this. There is a specific piece of work going on looking at the budget for future years.

Overtime was discussed and some issues relating to the bedding in of the new CROWN system.

A discussion took place in relation to the estate in West Cumbria, this is now being looked at in more detail as it was previously delayed due to COVID.

The Commissioner felt there was a wider discussion to be held in relation to the estate in general, taking into account developments in LGR and Blue Light.

It was noted that sustainability & the green agenda are high priorities for HMICFRS.

Following a discussion, the presentation was noted; and the recommendations were all approved in accordance with the detail set out within the report.

#### **007. TREASURY MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES 2021/22 – QUARTER 2 TO SEPTEMBER 2021**

The report was presented by the Chief Finance Officer.

It was acknowledged that a cautious approach has been taken, as it is not worth being exposed to any unnecessary risk.

Balances are close to budget & it was noted that there is expected to be a gradual increase in interest rates from next year.

Treasury management indicators and tolerances are all within limits.

The possibility of a pay rise was discussed as the Chancellor had announced the lifting of the pay freeze. We are currently waiting for more information on this, and there will be negotiations with unions etc.

Following a discussion, the report was noted.

# Quantitative Data – Drug Related Deaths


## Context:

- Increase in wider health impact factors (anxiety, MH etc).
- Increase in recreational drugs use (cocaine) and illicit pharmaceuticals available on street / online.


## Response:

- Established county wide multi-agency Drug Harm Prevention Group
- Sustainable ‘prevent and divert’ intervention and messaging – Public Health, third sector and police.
- Improved data enabled response to identify prevent / reduction opportunities.
- Combined enforcement and prevent approach to disrupt illicit drugs markets.

# Context / intelligence behind the data

## Heroin

**Cohort:** Often low level offenders involved in SAC, theft related offences and street level supply on behalf of Drug traffickers / higher level suppliers.

**Setting:** Neighbourhoods, private space

## 'Recreational' Drugs – Cocaine, MDMA

**Cohort:** Whilst there are some low level offenders who abuse these drugs, there is a cohort of predominantly adults in employment who are use these drugs on a social basis.

**Setting:** Night time economy, events such as festivals, private spaces.

## Cannabis

**Cohort:** The use of this drugs is widespread across the demographic and extends to under 18's

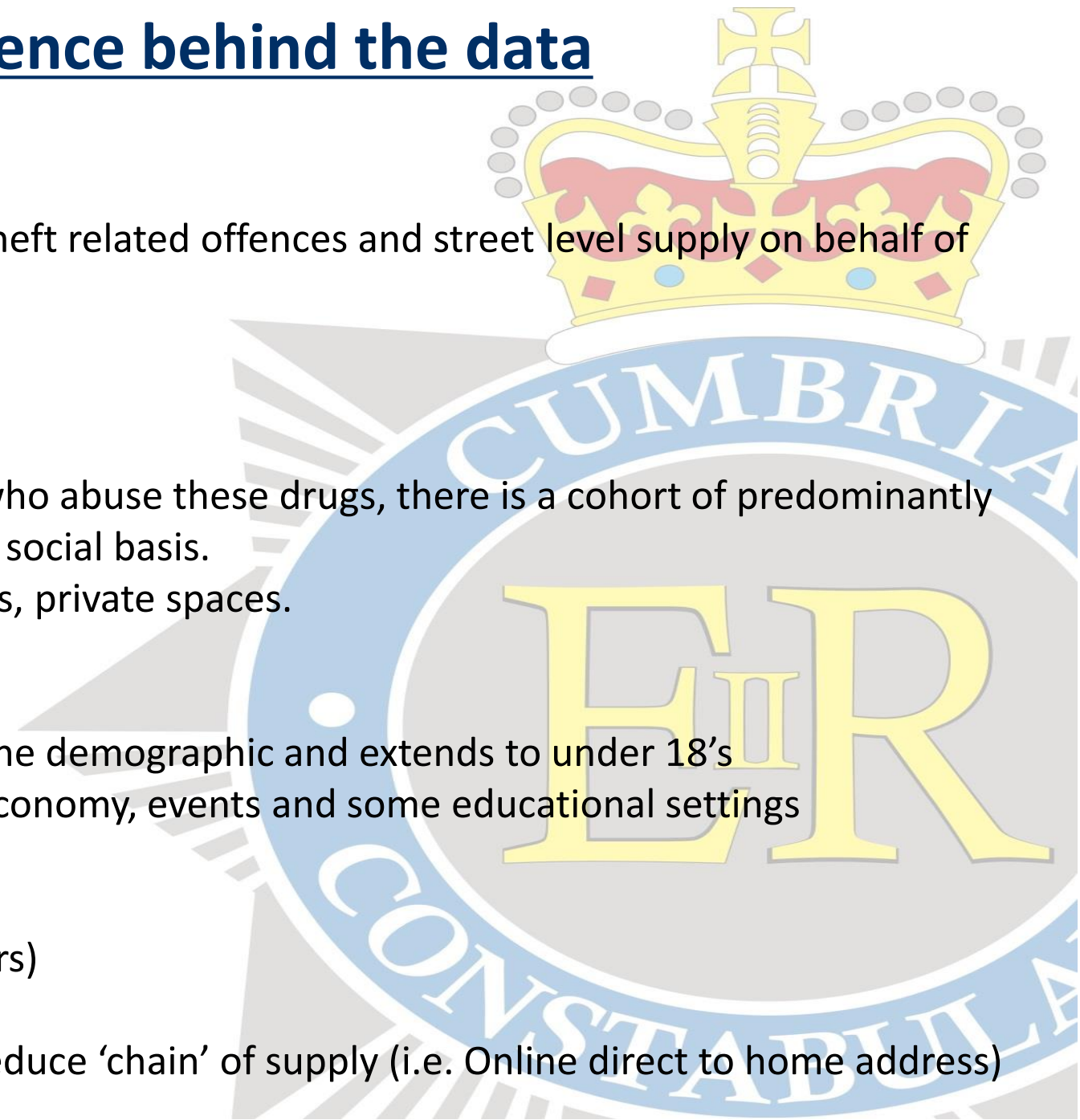
**Setting:** Private dwelling, public space, night Time economy, events and some educational settings

## 'Illicit Pharma' / drugs online

**Cohort:** often opiate users (heroin & prescribed users)

**Setting:** Private space.

## PROTECT

- Employ a multi-agency approach to the early identification of potential victims of CL.
- Implement early intervention / safeguarding measures in relation to potential victims & ‘at risk’ groups of CL.
- Support victims to become resilient against future CL involvement.

## PURSUE

- Relentlessly target identified CLCG operating in Cumbria utilising partners and front line, community and specialist police resources.
- Target CLCG on local road, rail, neighbourhoods and within exporting force areas.
- Utilise all appropriate legislation & civil and criminal legal instruments to disrupt CLCG.

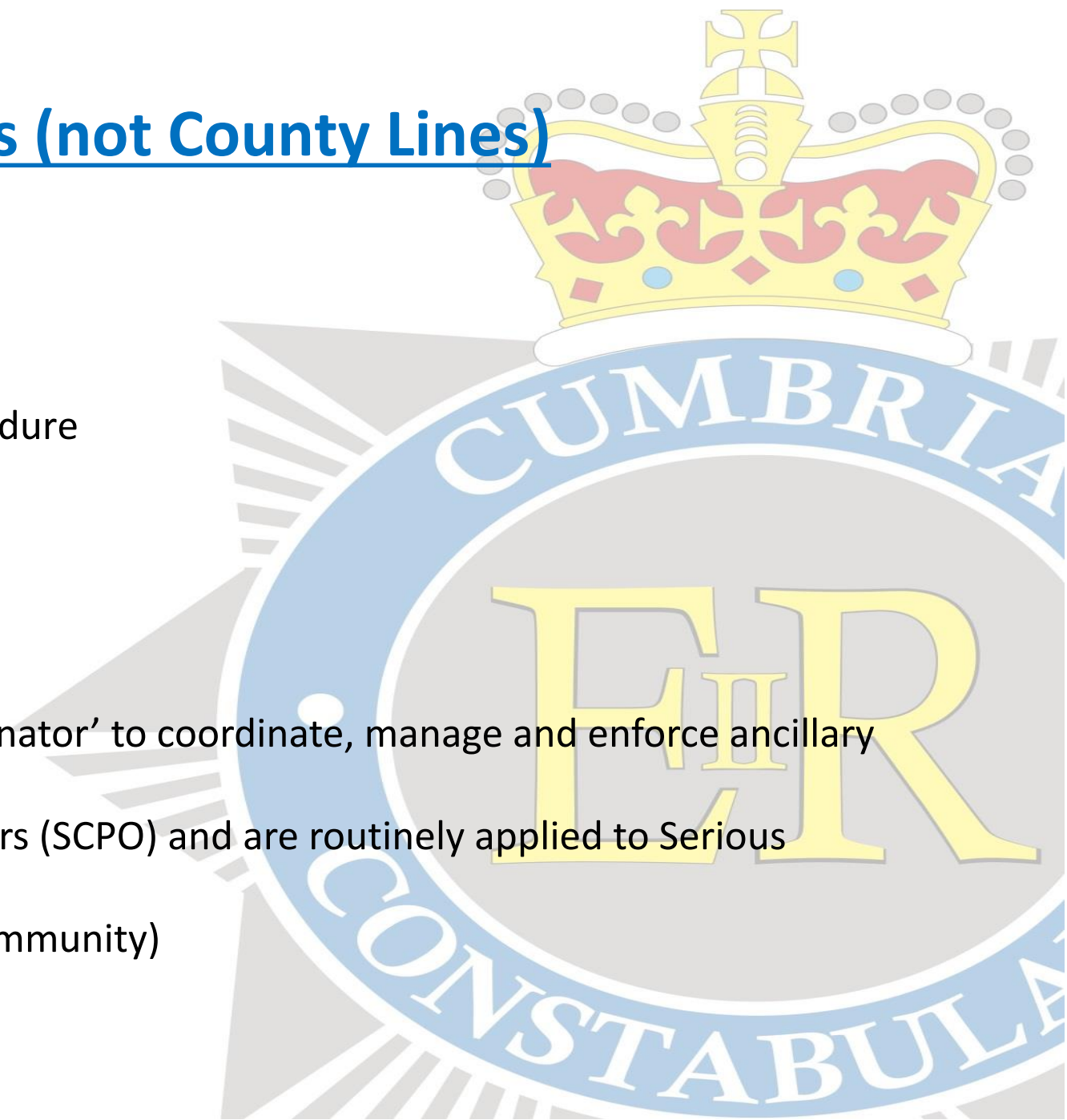

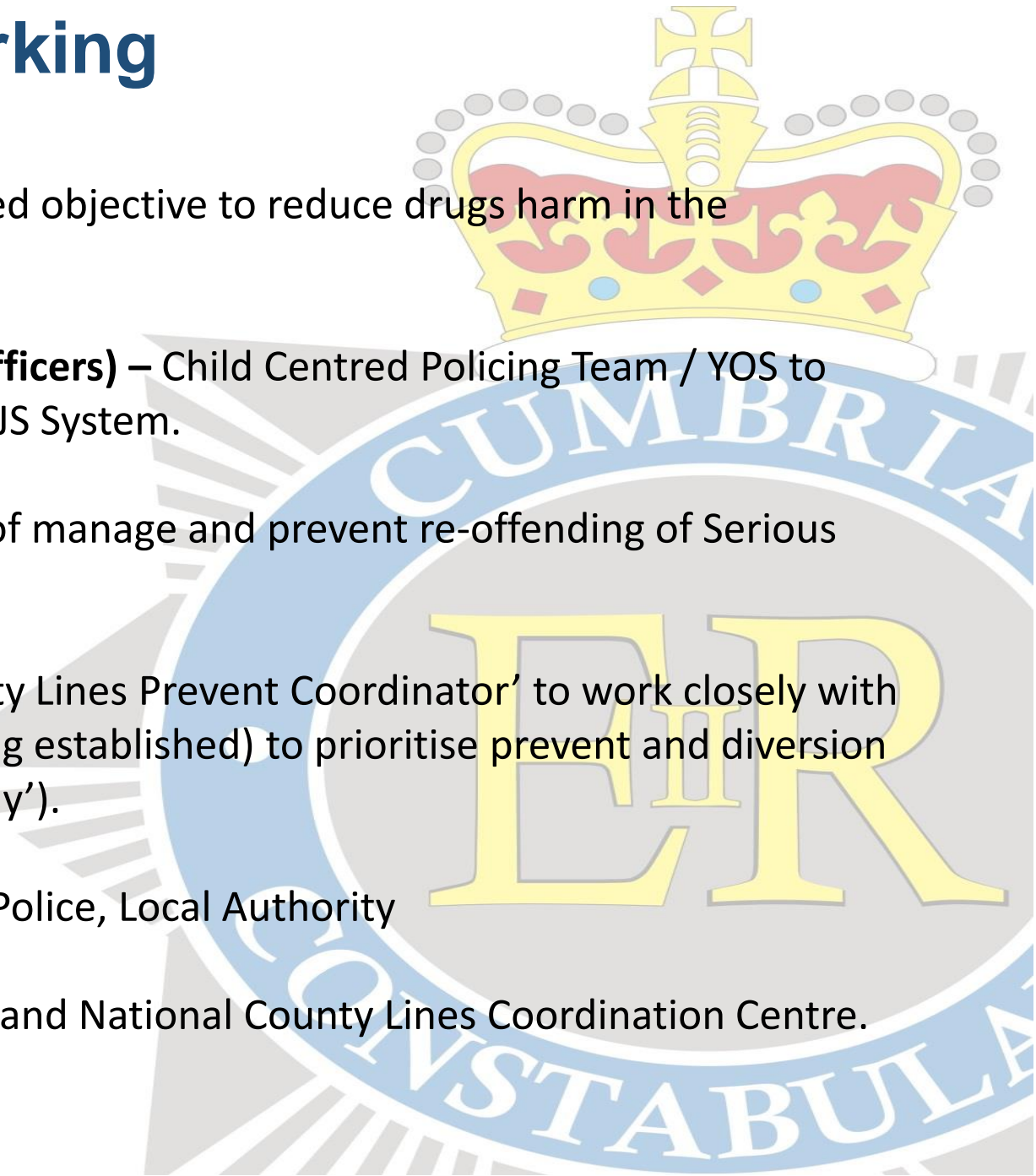
## Ancillary Orders

- Cumbria Police utilises a 'SOC Prevent Coordinator' to coordinate, manage and enforce ancillary orders to prevent continuing SOC offending.
- These include Serious Crime Prevention Orders (SCPO) and are routinely applied to Serious Drugs Offenders.
- SCPO – 19 orders awarded (4 active in the community)



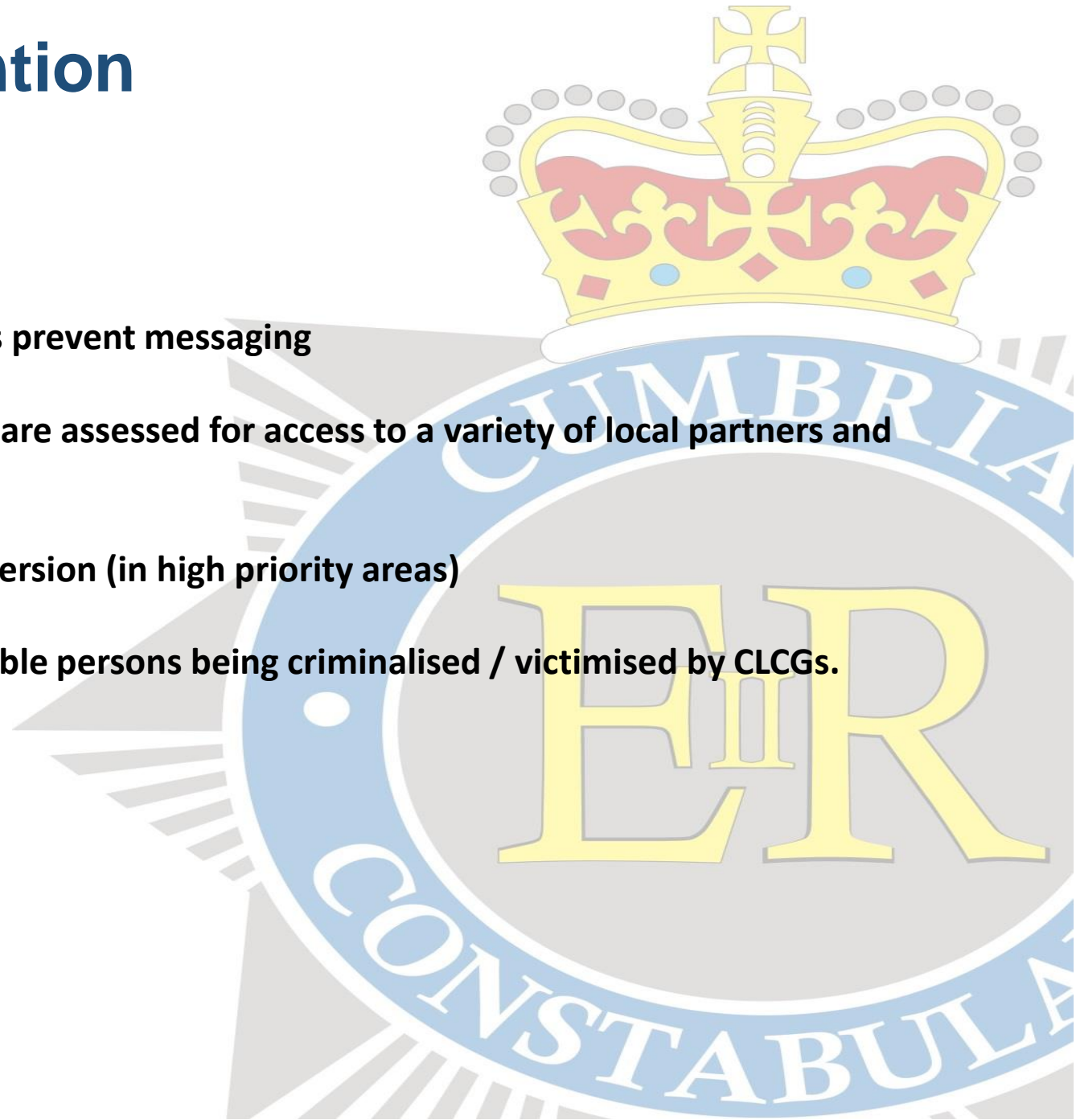
# Partnership Working

- **Drugs Harm Reduction Group** – MA Group with shared objective to reduce drugs harm in the community.
- **Youth Offending Service (Youth Substance Misuse Officers)** – Child Centred Policing Team / YOS to divert young people away from substance abuse and JS System.
- **Probation Services** – Police / HMPS to management of manage and prevent re-offending of Serious drugs offenders.
- **Barrow Drugs Diversion partners** – new Police ‘County Lines Prevent Coordinator’ to work closely with Barrow Drugs Diversion and Treatment partners (being established) to prioritise prevent and diversion to disrupt CL model (‘Reduce Demand / Reduce Supply’).
- **Localised partnership liaison via Local Focus Hubs** – Police, Local Authority
- **National and Regional Law Enforcement** – NWROCU and National County Lines Coordination Centre.



# Prevention

- **Training and Awareness to Police & Partners**
- **Child Centred Policing Team – Young Persons drugs prevent messaging**
- **Liaison & Diversion (in custody suites) – detainees are assessed for access to a variety of local partners and services.**
- **New partnership roles to focus on Prevent and Diversion (in high priority areas)**
- **CLiPPs – Targeted interventions to prevent vulnerable persons being criminalised / victimised by CLCGs.**

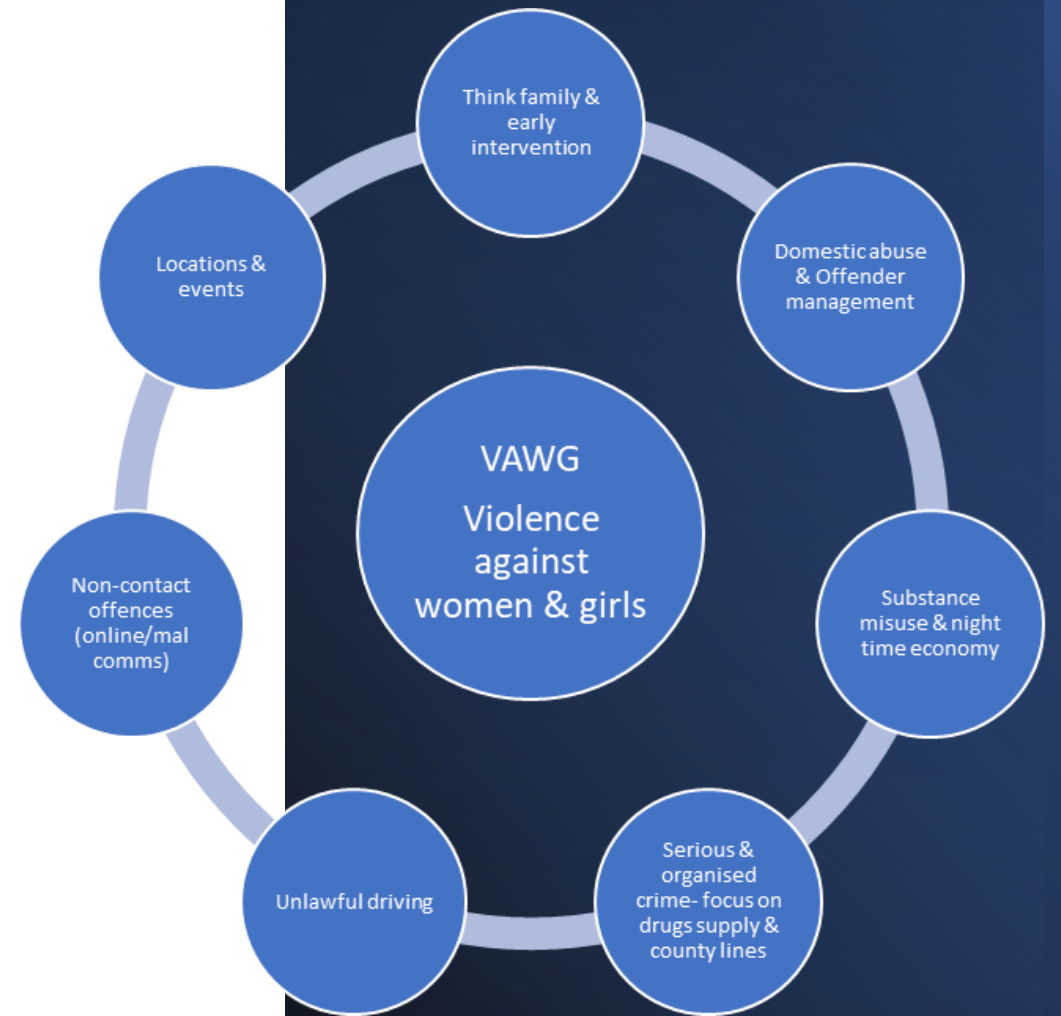

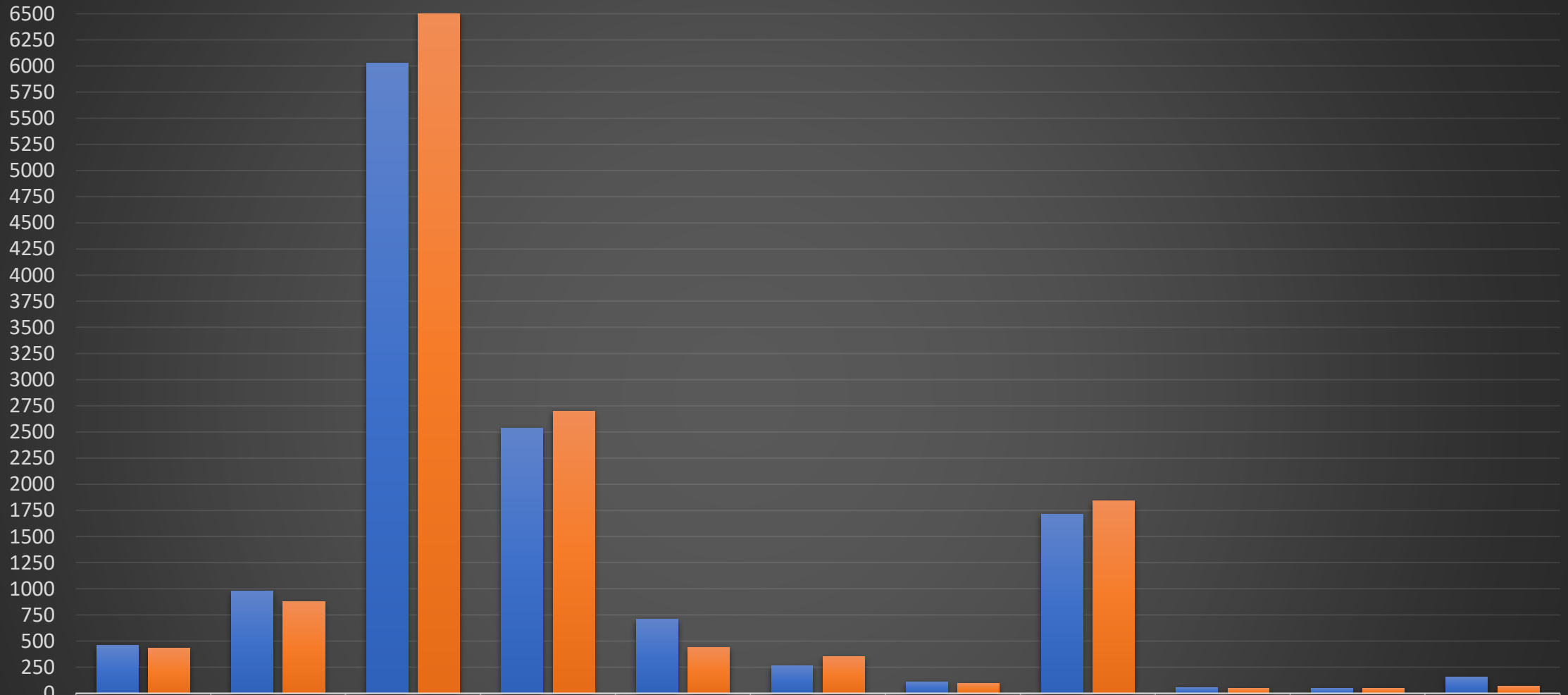


## Crime Data – period 01/11/2020 – 01/11/2021

- **81.1% of all sexual offences reported in Cumbria are female victims**

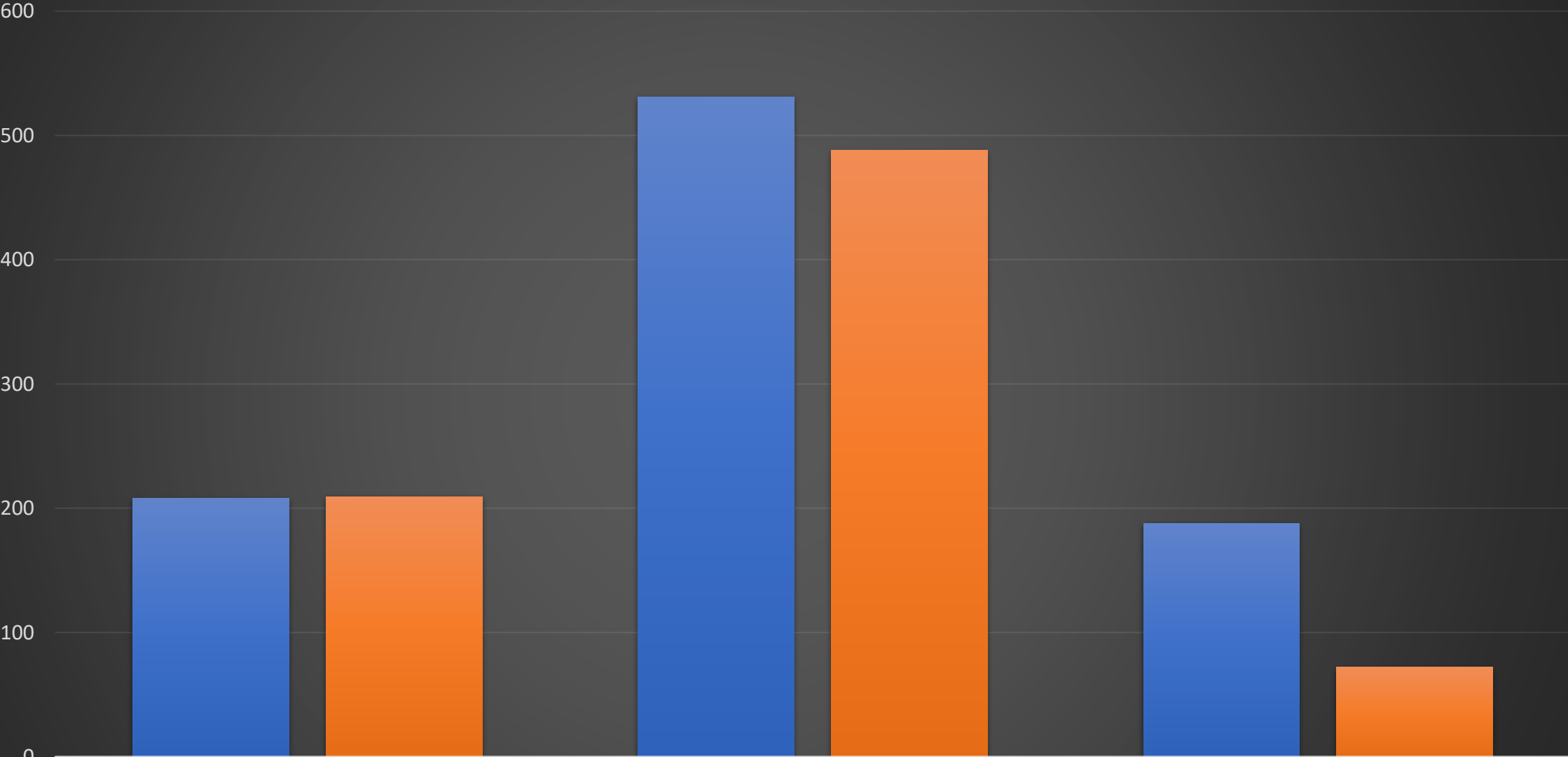


# Number of recorded crimes

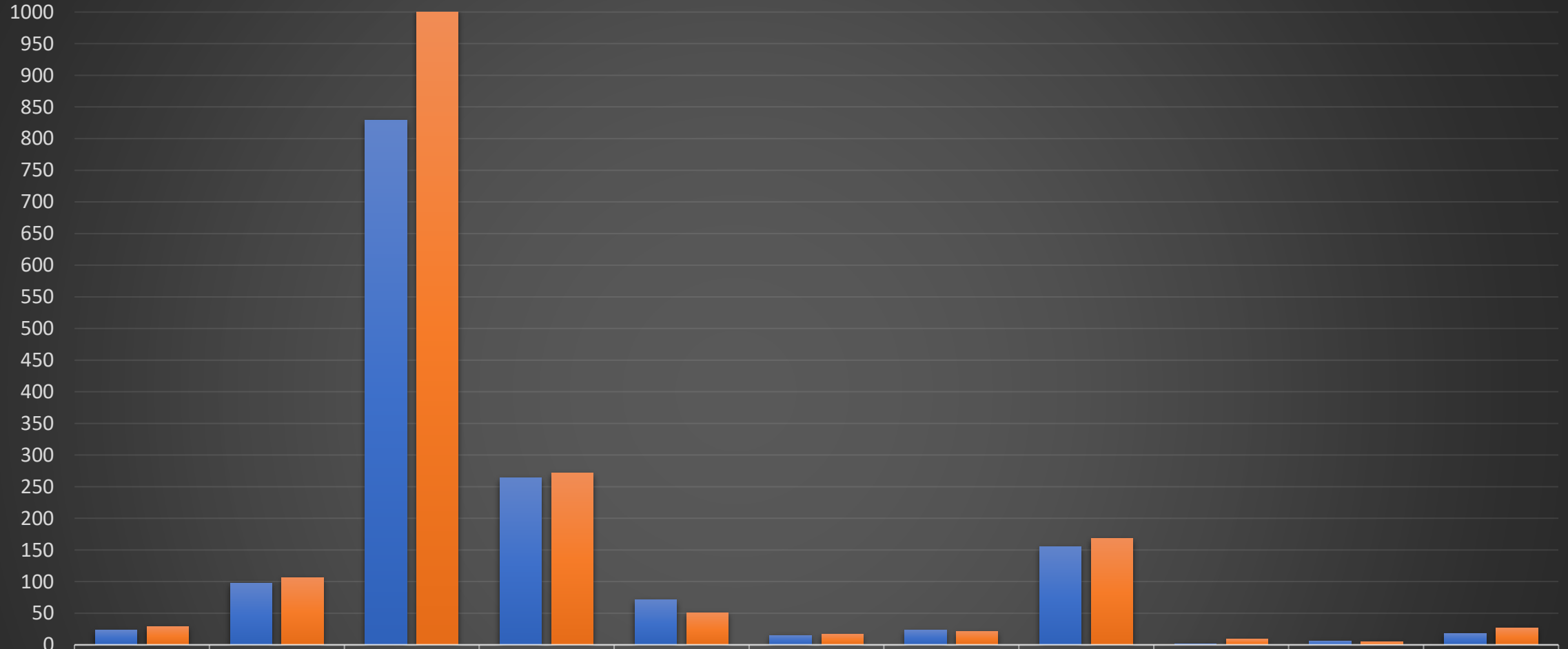

- **DV NFA ERO process established, number of uniform Sgts have additional training in reviewing Domestic violence cases. The aim is to ensure we continue to effectively increase the number of referrals to CPS for charging, to reduce the number of cases which are NFA by the Police.**
  - **Op DART – identifies top 10 DV perpetrators in area on a monthly basis at vulnerability meetings. These are allocated to an Inspector; with the expectation they are tasked out daily for patrol activity and targeting of the perpetrator.**
- **The investigation process for RASSO and all serious offences involves regular reviews by the DS, DI and DCI so the progress and strength of the evidence in each case is closely monitored throughout.**
- **A decision made by a DS to NFA a RASSO offence has to be ratified by a DI and in more serious offences by a DCI.**
- **Cumbria Constabulary are currently trialing a Rape Surgery pilot which allows all rape cases with a supportive Victim and a known offender, to be discussed with a dedicated RASSO Lawyer**

- Cumbria has a well resourced Management of sexual offenders & Violent offenders department (MOSOVO. We manage 800 sex offenders, 600 of those being in the community
- OM's have the benefit of our in house polygraph team, civil orders, monitoring software on offender's devices and support from the wider police family
- The MOSOVO unit works in line with national guidance and the offenders under management have a very low rate of reconviction for further sexual offences.
- MOSOVO are very proactive in detecting offending and generate numerous arrests and prosecutions for breach of court order and notification requirement on a monthly basis. This activity prevents more serious offending by enforcing protective orders and conditions





- The Constabulary follows the national guidance around ‘Sarah’s Law’ or the Child Sex Offenders Disclosure Scheme (CSODS). In 2020 there were 25 CSODS applications and 20% of those resulted in a disclosure being made.
- All offenders who are convicted of a qualifying sex offence will be considered for a Sexual Harm Prevention Order. In 2020 44 such orders were granted by the court. .
- The Constabulary uses sexual risk orders in a similar way to SHPOS’s for those offenders who do not have a qualifying conviction. . Two SRO’s were issued in 2020 and we have 4 already in 2021 – this is an area we wish to increase in future.





- Through local focus hubs, partnership working is common practice and hub referrals will focus on VAWG locations, which will be adopted as community priorities
- Ask for Angela launch through partnership working with licensing and local councils.
- Dedicated safeguarding hub works closely with partners such as DV support agencies, social services, early help teams, family liaison to provide a wide range of support and safeguarding measures to victims of domestic and sexual abuse.

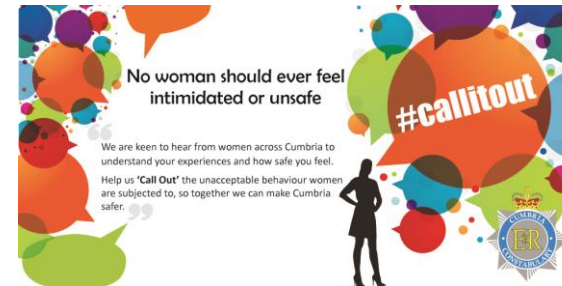
