Apologies for absence were received from the Chief Constable (Rob Carden); the Assistant Chief Constable (Jonathan Blackwell); the Assistant Chief Constable (Dave Stalker); the OPFCC Chief Executive (Gill Shearer); and the OPFCC Bluelight Collaboration Manager (Steph Stables);

005. MINUTES

The Chair presented the minutes of the Public Accountability Conference held on the 15th February 2024 which had previously been circulated with the agenda. The minutes were agreed as an accurate record and signed by the Chair.

006. FINANCIAL SUMMARY 2023/24 - QUARTER 3 TO DECEMBER 2023

The presentation was given by the Chief Finance Officer.

The Q3 position at the end of December 2023 shows an improved position with a £113k group overspend.

The December forecast overspend is comprised of an overspend on Constabulary budgets of £323k and an underspend on OPFCC budgets of £210k, made up predominantly by Police Officer pay.

DCC Martland advised that the Constabulary have consciously gone over the figures for additional uplift officers, as a £288k penalty would be incurred at the end of March if we do not meet out uplift target.

007. TREASURY MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES 2023/24 QUARTER 3 (OCTOBER TO DECEMBER 2023)

The presentation was given by the Chief Finance Officer.

We are benefiting from an increase in interest rates, with £950k against an investment budget of £400k.



There will be no borrowing requirement during this financial year, although going forward there will be a longer-term issue and there will be a borrowing requirement for the Capital Programme.

The borrowing strategy was originally based on assumed borrowing of £3m in 2022/23 and a further £3m in 2023/24. As a result of the 2022/23 outturn, the planned borrowing was instead predicted to take place in 2023/24. The latest Qtr 3 update estimates borrowing is not now required until 2024/25 and is reflected in the longer-term strategy.

During the period 01 October 2023 and 30 December 2023, the treasury function has operated within the treasury and prudential indicators set out in the Treasury Management Strategy Statement and in compliance with the Treasury Management Practices. Compliance with the prudential and treasury indicators are shown on page 3 of the report, which available to view on the Commissioner's website.

Following a discussion, the report was noted.

008. DECISION 001-2024 - CAPITAL STRATEGY 2024/25

The presentation was given by the Chief Finance Officer.

The report is available to view on the Commissioner's website, and the purpose of the report is to provide information on the proposed capital strategy for 2024/25. The capital strategy (item 08a) is an overarching strategy that sits above the two documents which have been produced historically namely the capital programme (item 08b) and the treasury management strategy statement (item 08c). The capital strategy provides a high level overview of how capital expenditure, capital financing and treasury management activity contribute to the provision of services along with an overview of how associated risk is managed and the implications for future financial sustainability. The capital programme is developed in consultation with the Constabulary who are the primary user of the capital assets under the ownership of the Commissioner.

Local Authorities (including Police and Crime Commissioners) determine their own programmes for capital investment in non-current (fixed) assets that are essential to the delivery of quality public services. The Commissioner is required by regulation to have regard to The Prudential Code when carrying out his duties in England and Wales under part 1 of the Local Government Act 2003. The Prudential Code establishes a framework to



support local strategic planning, local asset management planning and proper option appraisal. The objectives of the Prudential Code are to ensure: "within a clear framework, that the capital investment plans of local authorities are affordable, prudent and sustainable". In the past, to meet these requirements, all schemes within the 5 year medium term capital programme are only approved on the basis that they are fully funded either through capital grants, capital reserves, capital receipts, revenue contributions or borrowing. The proposed programme meets this test only with the planned increase use of borrowing. The estimates for 5-10 years are however built on a number of assumptions, which, particularly in rapidly changing sectors such as ICT, are difficult to accurately predict. This means that projected costs in the later years of the capital programme become increasingly indicative and should be treated with caution.

The Commissioner was asked to approve the following recommendations:-

- 1.1. Capital Strategy (Item 08a) The Commissioner is asked to approve the capital strategy including the prudential indicators set out in the report.
- 1.2. Capital Programme (Item 08b) The Commissioner is asked to:
 - Approve the capital programme for 2024/25 and beyond as part of the overall budget process for 2024/25.
 - Approve the status of capital projects as detailed in appendices 2 to 5.
- 1.3. Treasury Management Strategy (Item 08c) The Commissioner is asked to:
 - Approve the Borrowing Strategy for 2024/25 as set out on pages 8-9
 - Approve the Investment Strategy for 2024/25 as set out on pages 10-13
 - Approve the Treasury Management Prudential Indicators as set out on pages 15-16
 - Approve the other Prudential Indicators set out on pages 17 to 21
 - Approve the Minimum Revenue Provision Policy Statement for 2024/25 as set out on page 22
 - Delegate to the OPFCC Chief Finance Officer any non-material amendments arising from scrutiny of the strategy by the Joint Audit Committee.

009. DECISION 002-2024 2024/25 BUDGET AND MEDIUM-TERM FINANCIAL FORECAST

The papers provide provisional financial information for the years 2025/26 to 2027/28 and for 10 years in respect of the capital programme and reserves.

The Commissioner was asked to note the attached OPFCC Chief Financial Officer's report on the robustness of the budget 'the Local Government Act 2003 Requirements' report (item 09a), taking into account his advice in respect of his decisions on the proposed budgets.

Appendix B of the report 'Budget 2024/25 and Financial Forecasts 2025/26 to 2028/29 (item 09b) sets out the budget resolution for decision by the Commissioner in order to formally approve the level of council tax precept. In the context of the budget resolution, it is recommended that:

- a) The revenue budgets outlined in the report and appendices be approved, having regard to the Local Government Act 2003 Requirements report
- b) That the budget requirement for 2024/25 be set on the basis of the amount within the budget resolution at appendix B
- c) The council tax for Band D properties be approved at £310.05 for 2024/25, an increase of £12.96 or 4.36%, being the amount within the budget resolution

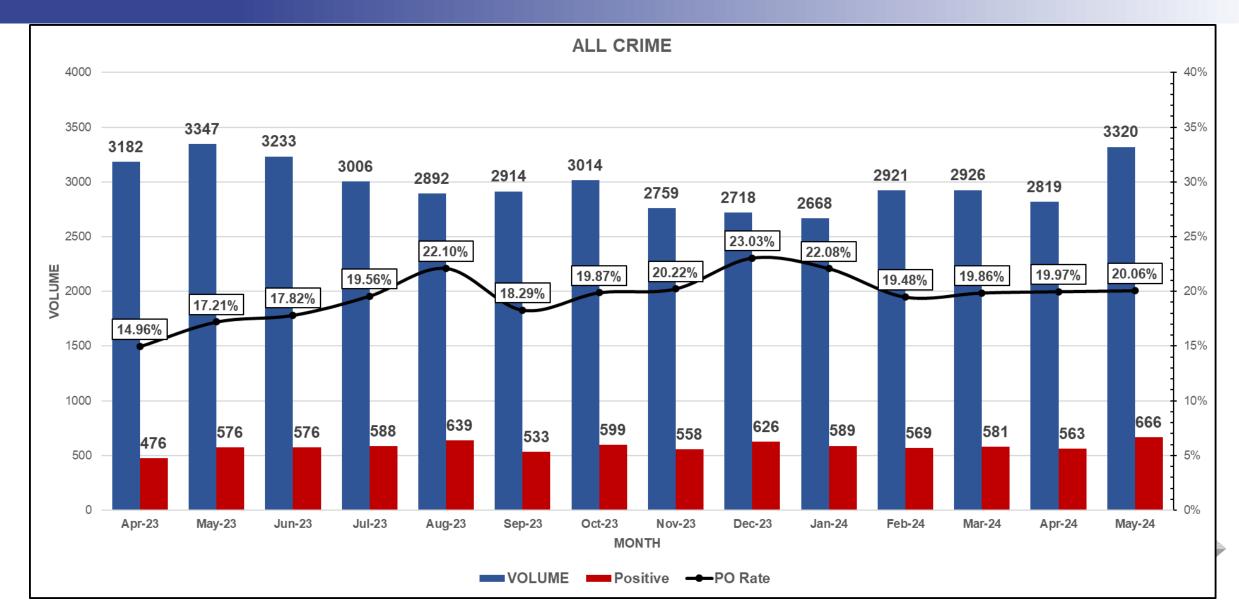

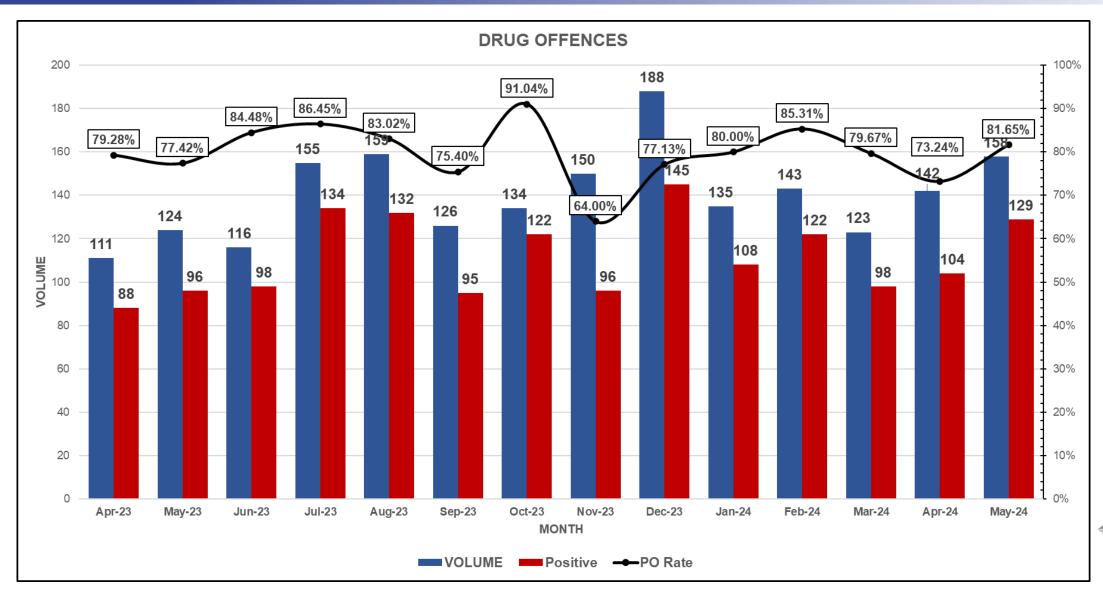

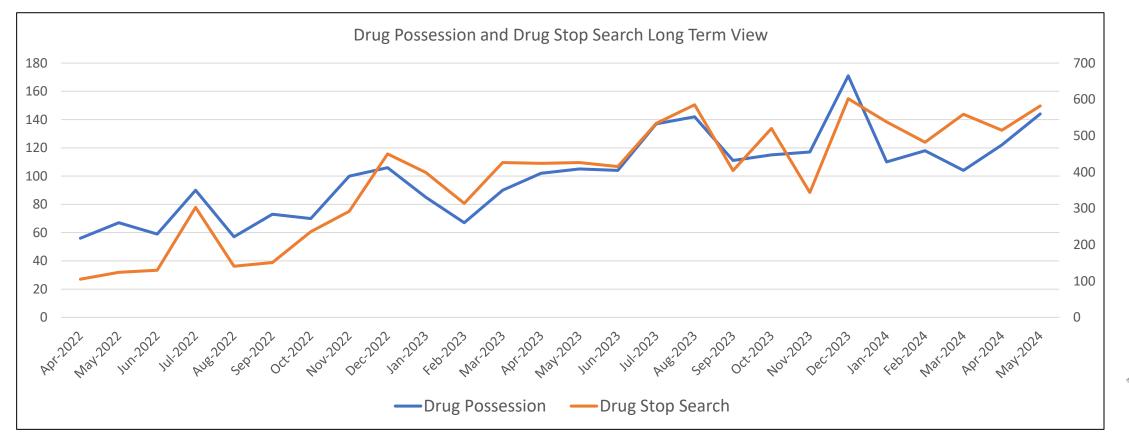


Drug Possession Offences and Drug Related Stop Search



The graph shows the volume of drug related stop search along with the volume of drug possession offences from April 2022 to May 2024.

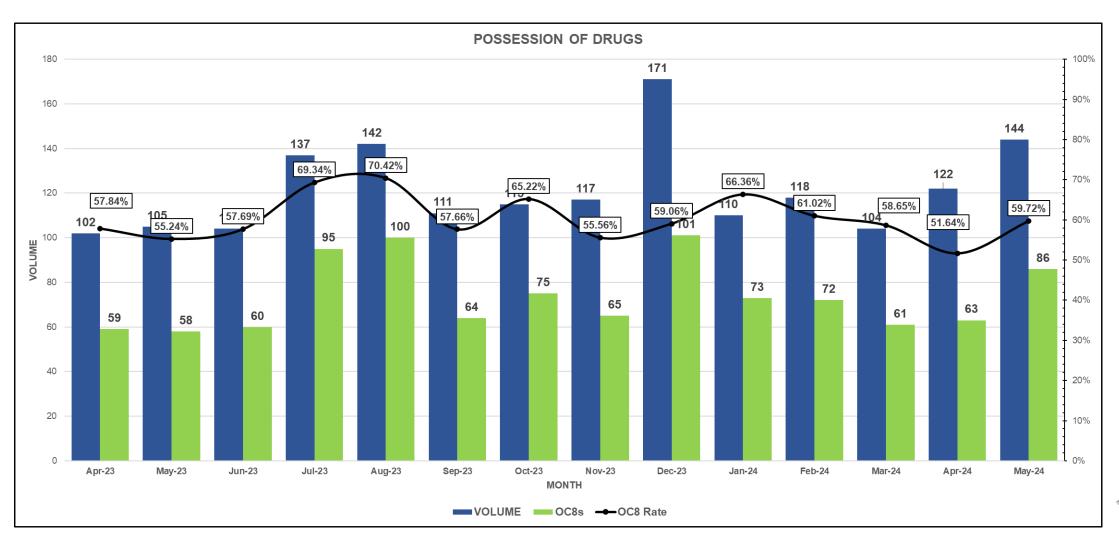
Pearson Correlation Coefficient is **0.88** - **strong positive correlation**. We can be confident that the increase in drug possession is as a result of increased stop search activity.

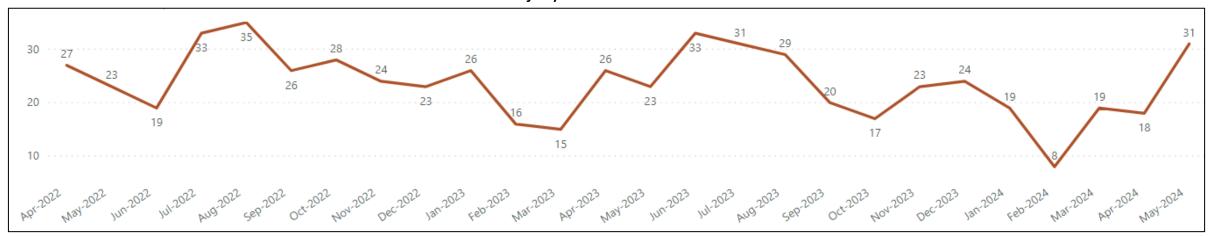

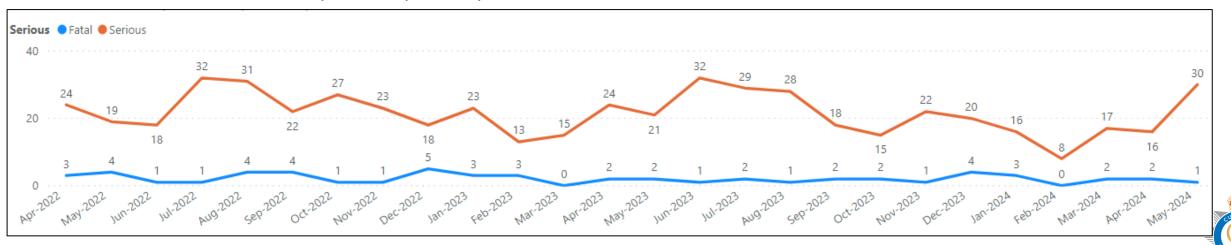
Killed & Seriously Injured Collisions (KSI)



Volume of collisions each month where the most serious injury was serious or fatal.



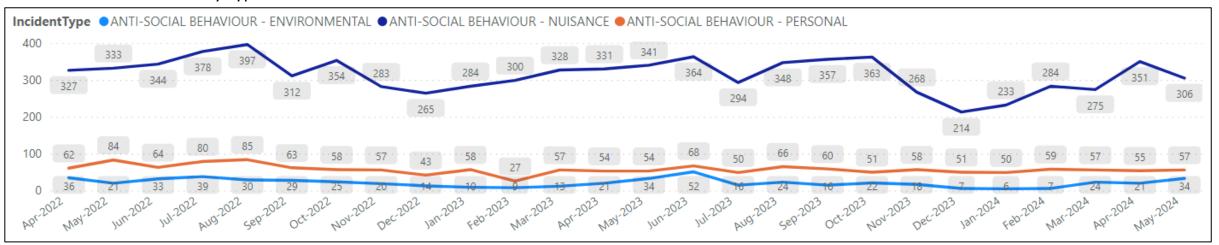
Volume of collisions each month separated by severity



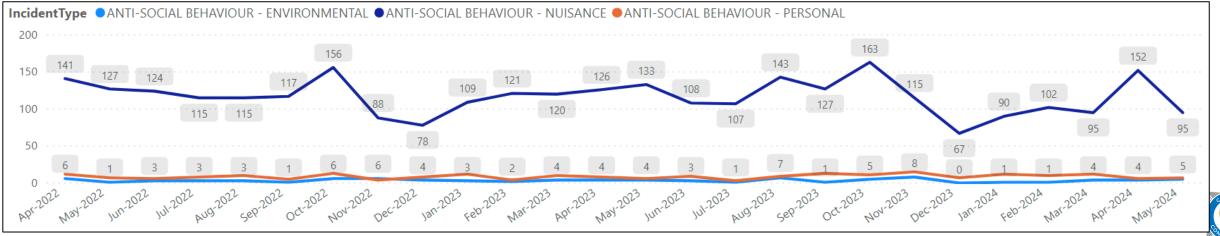

Case Study - Old Line Workington



- Workington NPT established a girls and women engagement network (GWEN), linked to our VAWG priorities.
- We visited a group of girls at Workington Academy, a seldom heard group, to find out the areas in Workington which they did not feel safe
- The Old Line was identified, backed up by data from the street safe tool. A further survey was conducted with residents, 75% of women and girls who responded stated they didn't feel safe using the Line.
- Issues reported included signs of drug and alcohol misuse, ASB, off road bikes, groups of men and boys making women and girls feel intimidated. The area was overgrown and dark, some areas were dark even through the day.
- We established a multi-agency response through our Local Focus Hub to identify how we could improve the Line for everyone. Partners included, Cumberland Council, Workington Town Council, Green Spaces, Ground Work, local businesses, local sports clubs, Beardy Synergy (professional artist), landscape architects, housing associations
- The Line became our VAWG hotspot, we ensured regular Police Patrols were made in the area.
- Applied for Safer Streets 5 funding through the OPCC. Successful in obtaining approx. £48k in funding to make improvements.



Case Study - Old Line Workington

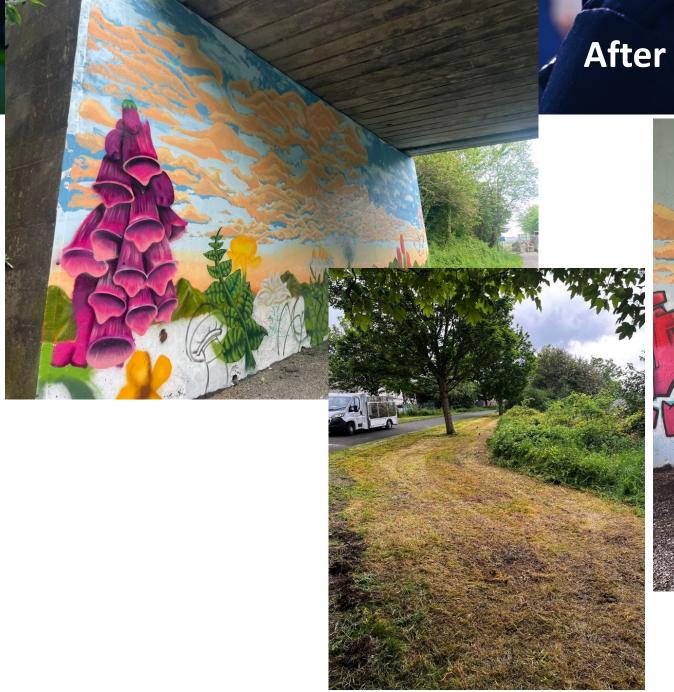


- Engaged with local residents through letter drops, informing them of the project and encouraging feedback. Presentations were also made to the Town Council.
- Work carried out over the course of 6 months, which included cutting back overgrown areas with specialist teams, community litter picks arranged with partners and stakeholders, including members of the community joining in. We ensured all street lighting was working and suitable in the area.
- We engaged with the local schools and College, to bring together a group of girls to design and deliver an art project to cover up the offensive graffiti on a road bridge. This was delivered through a professional artist.
- Engagement with local sports clubs, running clubs and encouraged use of the Line for training/running clubs etc.
- Project completed in May 2024 lots of positive feedback from the local community, partners and stakeholders.
- The OPFCC were integral in the identification, development, and reporting of this project which led to a Home Office representatives visiting the area. They were very impressed with the partnership working which delivered the project.
- We intend to survey the community in the next 2-3 months to reality check the success of the project.

Operation Enhance



- 18 Hotspots identified across Cumbria which link to serious Violence and/or ASB.
- £1 million investment from the Home Office to help tackle the issues which has been secured through the OPFCC's office.
- This will provide an additional high visibility presence but also provide funds for long term partnership working and problem solving which the NPTs are leading with.

Cost of rural crime



COUNTING THE COST OF CRIME

Based on NFU Mutual claim statistics, we estimate that rural theft cost the UK £49.5m in 2022, up 22.1% on the previous year.

While Scotland saw a decrease, most areas of the UK saw a rise in rural crime costs as thieves returned to the countryside and ramped up their activity after the pandemic years.

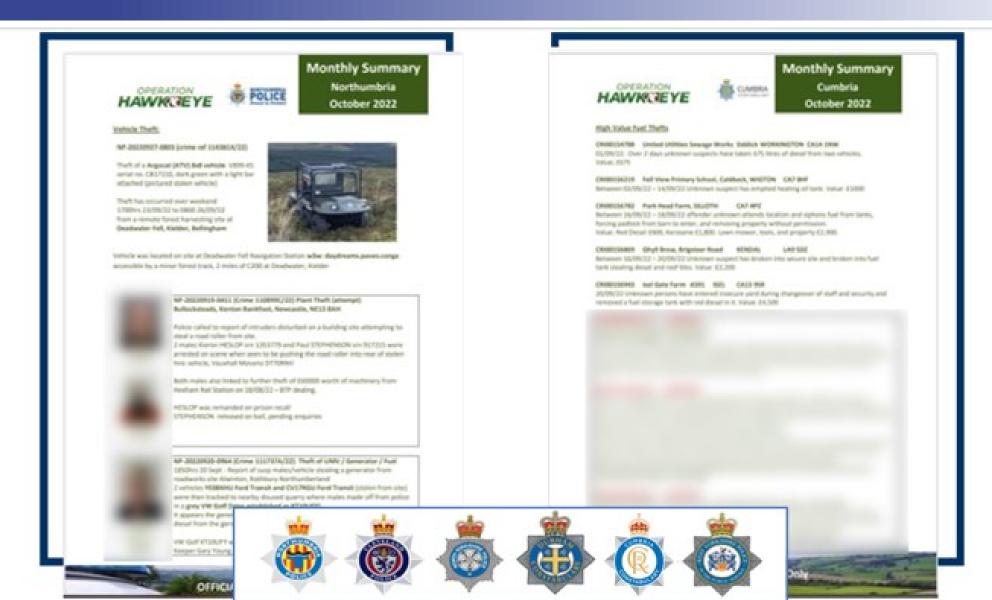
