003. URGENT BUSINESS AND EXCLUSION OF THE PRESS AND PUBLIC

006. POLICING PERFORMANCE

The presentation was given by the Director of Performance and Change.

999 call performance is strong and has improved significantly since 2023. On average, 95% of 999 calls are answered within 10 seconds. The national KPI is 90% so Cumbria is sitting well above that.

101 call performance is consistently high, and sitting not less than 95% of calls answered within 5 minutes. There is a consistent low abandonment rate of under 5%. It is worth noting that figures can be affected by one off anomalies such as a random caller making a lot of calls over a 4 - 5 hour period.

Response performance for the 2022-23 financial year is 77.2% however, the most recent data shows response data is sitting at 90%. The process is consistently tight with one minute between a call being answered to a log being created to dispatch.

Compared to our most similar group (MSG) there is a 15 – 20 minute target for most forces. Roads policing plays a big part and Cumbria also has some unique geography / topography issues.

Grade 2 response - 93% average so far this year on target compared to and average of 60% for 2022/23. Good performance is being maintained.

The Commissioner asked if the Constabulary is happy with the quality of answer and response? The Chief Constable responded that yes they were happy; investigative standards have seen huge increases and are quality assured.



The Constabulary ended the financial year 2023/24 with a positive outcome rate of 19.4%. This was a 4.6pp increase from the 2022/23 positive outcome rate of 14.8%. For the current FYTD (April-May 2024), the Constabulary have started in a stronger position again, with an outcome rate of 20.0%.

During 2023/24, there were 35,568 crimes recorded, which was an 8.3% decrease on 2022/23 (35,568, down from 38,795, 3227 fewer offences). FYTD the volume of all crime has decreased 0.6%, from 23,651 last FYTD to 21,611 this FYTD.

A formal performance framework was put in place last year using sophisticated tools, all working together. There are two tiers with review periods.

There has been a reduction in KPI's around acquisitive crime (no crime is also a measure). It is about layering. Right Care Right person has also been brought in, and has now been embedded.

There is a culture across the organisation with an understanding from the initial contact right through the investigation to understand where the challenges are. Drive activity is looked at each quarter.

Drug offences – Cumbria ended the most recent financial year with a positive outcome rate of 80.2%, which was a 7.6pp increase from the previous year (outcome rate of 72.6%) During 2023/24, there were 1664 drug offences recorded, which was a 45.6% increase on 2022/23 (1664, up from 1143, 521 additional offences).

In 2024/25, the volume of drug offences has increased by 27.7% when compared to the same period last year. In FYTD24/25 there have been 300 occurrences, against 235 occurrences in the SPLY. (+27.7%)

The positive outcome rate for Burglary has increased significantly from 9.3%- 10.4% (an increase of 16% and an impact of performance management).

The 17% reduction in Burglary is due to a number of factors such as:

- Key nominals removed
- Transient population
- Rural crime team
- Roads policing team
- Technology (ANPR)
- Improved CCTV wider coverage enables tracking



During 2023/24, there were 1588 sexual offences recorded, which was a 7.2% decrease on 2022/23 (1588, down from 1711, 123 fewer offences). In 24/25 there have been 330 occurrences, compared to 279 in the same period last year (+18.3%). DCC Martland has confidence in the reporting aspect and disclosure.

Nationally, the picture from charge to court is poor. The Conviction rate is different around the North West region. A strong pilot for rape surgeries (CPS) was in place but has now been withdrawn by the CPS, we are in negotiations to get back to dedicated charge lawyers. The Commissioner was asked to raise this during his next meeting with the Chief Crown Prosecutor for the NW region.

Theft figures are consistent with last year. A retail crime strategy has been launched with links into the national team. Trends tend to be around cost of living items such as nappies / food.

There is no minimum monetary threshold, and Cumbria Constabulary attend every job.

As a percentage, violence against shopworkers is decreasing:

- 2021 3%
- 2022 2%
- 2023 1.9%

During 2023/24, there were 537 Possession of Weapons offences recorded, which was a 16.2% increase on 2022/23 (537, up from 462, 75 additional offences). FYTD, when comparing volumes for the possession of weapons offences with the same period last year, there has been a 10.3% reduction in volume. In the FYTD24/25, there have been 96 occurrences, compared with 107 occurrences in the same period last year (-10.3%).

During 2023/24, there were 972 vehicle offences recorded, which was a 0.4% decrease on 2022/23 (972, down from 976, 4 fewer offences). The current year to date has seen a reduction of 24.4% compared to the same period last year.

Robbery – numbers are very low, which can make percentages appear high. During 2023/24, there were 178 Robbery offences recorded, which was a 15.6% increase on 2022/23 (178, up from 154, 24 additional offences). The current year to date has seen a reduction of 24.1% compared to the same period last year, which is 7 less offences.

During 2023/24, there were 15415 Violence Against the Person offences recorded, which was an 8.8% decrease on 2022/23 (15415, down from 16900, 1485 fewer offences).



DA has reduced by 7.3%. Volumes are monitored closely and repeat offenders identified. There is a significant DA audit ongoing at the moment with 500 DA cases have been audited to look at themes. Drug addiction & alcohol are factors.

Street based violence has reduced while the DA aspect is fairly static. 16% of DA has a malicious communications element (such as social media).

VAWG - During 2023/24, there were 7797 VAWG offences recorded, which was a 16.9% decrease on 2022/23 (7797, down from 9378, 1581 fewer offences). When comparing the volumes of VAWG offences to the same period last year, there has been a 17.22% reduction. In the FYTD24/25 there has been 1,308 occurrences, compared to 1,580 in the same period last year (-17.22%).

The number of KSI collisions has been decreasing over the last 2 years.

- FY2022/23 total 295 (monthly average: 24.6)
- FY2023/24 total 272 (monthly average: 22.7)

There was a 27% reduction in the number of fatal collisions from FY2022/23 to FY2023/24.

The main type of ASB is Nuisance for both all ASB and youth related. However, the percentage of nuisance ASB for youth is 90.5% of the total whereas for nonyouth it is only 74.4% of the total. ASB (all and youth) has been decreasing over the last two years.

007. THEMATIC PERFORMANCE – POLICE VISIBILITY

The presentation was given by Chief Superintendent Bird.

Citizens in Policing doesn't currently sit within Neighbourhood Policing. Great strides have been made but there is more that can be done.



Aligned with College of Policing guidelines, 7 strands fit within the following 3 main areas:-

- Delivery (NHP)
- Supporting (NHP)
- Evidence gaps.

The organisation structure of the NPT is led by Chief Superintendent Bird with distribution of resources over four quadrants:

- Carlisle
- Derwent & Esk
- Kendal
- Eden

Each locality has priorities, with named officers & CBO's (detailed on the Constabulary website).

The model in Cumbria has been used as best practice and HMIC have signposted other areas to see what Cumbria are doing. There is a bespoke training package which is accredited and nationally recognised (3 blocks of 2 day training).

The PCSO 16 week training programme is being reviewed and streamlined by L&D.

The presentation shows a summary of the roles and responsibilities of the CBO and a flow chart to show the purpose, incorporating the THRIVESC principles.

The role profile seeks to focus on the core functions of the PSCO & CBO. The CBO policy will be revised to better understand abstractions.

Building relationships and engagement within communities is key.

There is a recruitment drive every year for Special Constables. Currently there are 46 Specials and 1 Cyber Special, and together they completed 10,555 hours last year.

Citizens in Policing deliver the Cadets and Mini Police programmes. Some nuances need to be addressed to get to hard to reach areas. The starting point is 100 every year split across 5 bases in Cumbria.

Some Cadets are reaching the age where they can progress to other roles (e.g. at 18 they would be eligible to join the Regulars or Specials). There is an aspiration to have a Junior Cadets Programme as there is currently a gap.

Various engagement events are supported by social media and newsletter as well as information on the website. Lots of joint working with partners and the OPFCC.

008. THEMATIC PERFORMANCE – RURAL CRIME

The presentation was given by T/Superintendent Skelton.

Cumbria was one of a handful of Forces who did not have a dedicated Rural Crime Team. This has now been addressed, with specific actions being carried out by the team such as:

- Targeted nights of action / cross border
- Community Protection Notices
- Disruption letters (62 to date with no repeat individuals)
- Members of community WhatsApp groups (note that this does not replace 101 or 999)

Staff have been upskilled with specific training carried out.

Hotspot mapping as well as use of thermal imaging cameras; ANPR; and drones help to target individuals. The FUSUS application brings everything together and is accessible by all Officers via their laptops / devices. Third party CCTV systems can also link in.




Call Answering 999 & 101 - 23/24 & FYTD





101 Abandonment Rates - 23/24 & FYTD











G1 Response Times



G2 Response Times










Drug Possession













Violence Against the Person Offences






Violence without Injury


